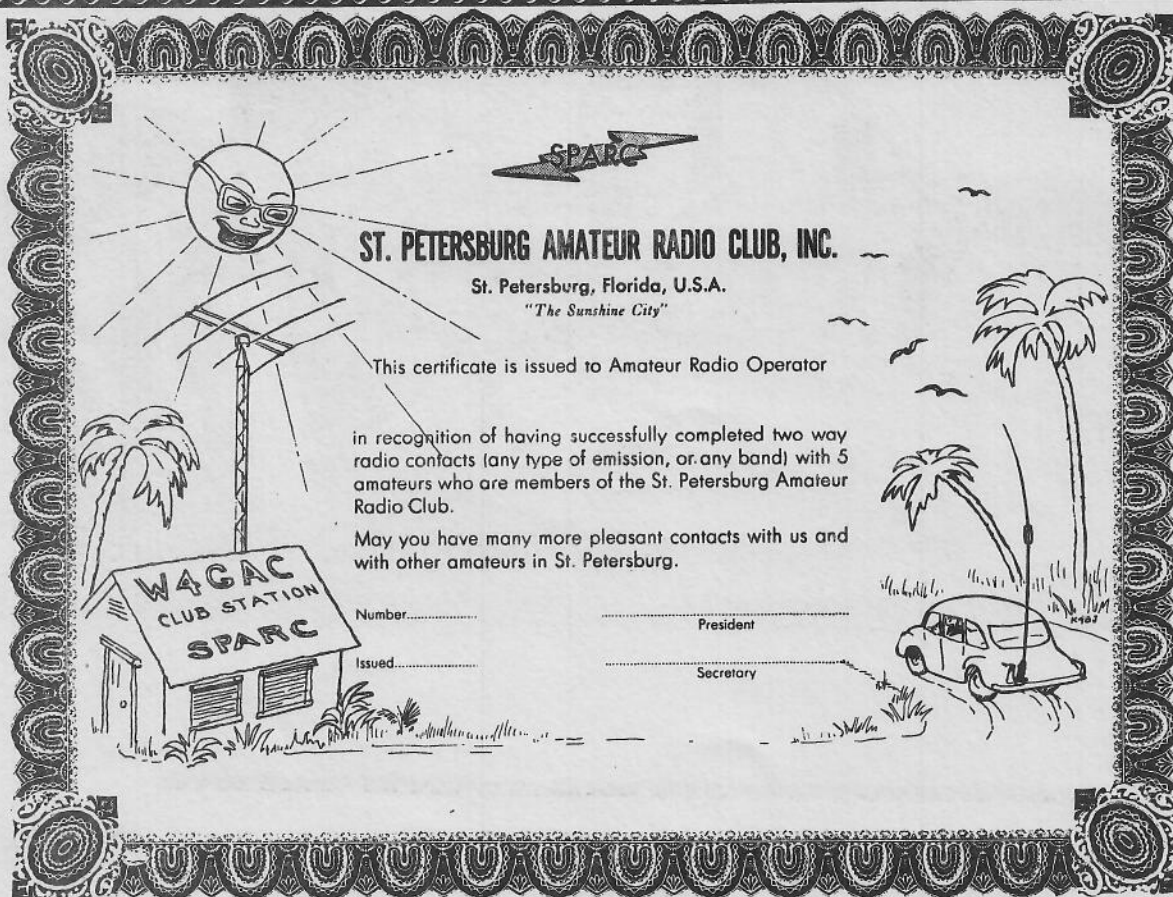

At the Orlando Hamfest, a guest speaker was Mr. A. Prose Walker, Chief of Amateur and Citizens Div., F.C.C. Washington D.C. With everyone clamoring for more frequencies, he brought up the following points, concerning the Amateurs, which are worth thinking about, as they are being considered by the F.C.C.

With so little equipment being built by the Amateurs, and the greatest part being commercially built, should standard specifications be set for such commercial gear.

Should the scope of the Radio Amateur be refined? What are their goals? Should the licensing structure be changed? Should a change be made in the examination system? For what purpose should additional bands be granted the Amateurs? Should participation in emergencies be made a condition of the license? Should the licensing structure be changed? Should a Conditional Class License be limited in time, say five years, so the licensee would have sufficient time to appear before an FCC officer for proper examination.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 424 from ARRL Headquarters, Newington, Connecticut.

How is Oscar doing? Contrary to rumors, Amsat says Oscar 6 is not near its end of life. It is felt that Oscar will achieve the one year design lifetime, but complete cooperation of users becomes an increasingly vital factor. The operating schedule has been modified leaving the satellite on for Thursday, Saturday and Monday GMT each week, to provide more frequent battery recharge periods. Recharging cannot take place if amateurs use the repeater during the off days. If you find the repeater on when it should be off, please do not transmit in the 145.9 to 146 MHz uplink band. Observance of the hundred watt effective radiated power limitation is another positive step to insure continued good performance. The traslater output band is 29.45 to 29.55 MHz.

Lets have some originality !!!! The ARRL and Radio Handbooks are valuable guides, fertile with ideas, and should be used as aids in the design and construction of our gear. Foreign amateurs, by the way, skin the pants off of us in this respect. Yet, frankly, many of them probably have no other choice.

The offering of the Amateur Extra Class License by the FCC is a challenge to amateurs, proficiency and achievement and something which every serious amateur should accept!!!

THE PRESIDENT COLUMN

In the good old days, the quite capable amateur could establish his proficiency by passing the commercial license examinations. Yet, today, there is such a marked difference between amateur and commercial equipments, techniques, and procedures that it is only infrequently that an amateur is able to pass the commercial examinations and only after special study for that purpose..... and even then, it does not indicate particularly his greater proficiency as an amateur! To be eligible for the Amateur Extra Class examination, the applicant must have had at least two years experience as a radio operator and must be able to send and receive code at 20 words per minute.

In addition, a special examination, just a little broader in scope than the General and advanced examinations, is given with a passing grade of 75 percent being required. All and all, after a little diligent study, including code practice, it is not too difficult to obtain as several of our SPARC-GAP members can testify. Any serious amateur worth his salt should not rest until he has accomplished this goal.

Official Bulletin NR 428: The ARRL Board of Directors meets twice annually to formulate the course of ARRL affairs. The second meeting of 1973 is scheduled for July 19. The full members of ARRL elect the board which has the overall responsibility for managing the affairs of the league. This democratic process is effective only to the extent that the membership participates. Now is the time for members and affiliated clubs to communicate their ideas, including those on the current RACES inquiry discussed on page 78 of June QST, to their division director at the address shown on page 8 of any 1973 QST.

!!Official Bulletin NR 429!!

Creation of a Class E Citizens Radio Service has been proposed by the Federal Communications Commission in a notice adopted June 6. It is suggested that the frequencies 224 to 225 MHz be withdrawn from the amateur service to create forty new CB channels. FCC seeks detailed comments on what activities should be permitted in such a service and what regulations should govern, with particular interest in enforcement procedures. This rulemaking proposal arises from RM 1747, filed two years ago by the Electronics Industries Association, and five other requests which FCC felt to be in the same basic area: RMs 1633, 1656, 1761, 1793 and 1841. Amateurs and clubs will undoubtedly wish to file official comments directly with FCC after reading the full text of the proposal in the August issue of QST. The deadline for comments is September 20. However, league members may want to inform their division directors of their initial reactions, prior to the ARRL Board meeting July 19. Names and addresses appear on page 8 of 1973 issues of QST. The headquarters seeks information on present and planned amateur use of the entire 220-225 MHz band with as much statistical information as possible. !!
