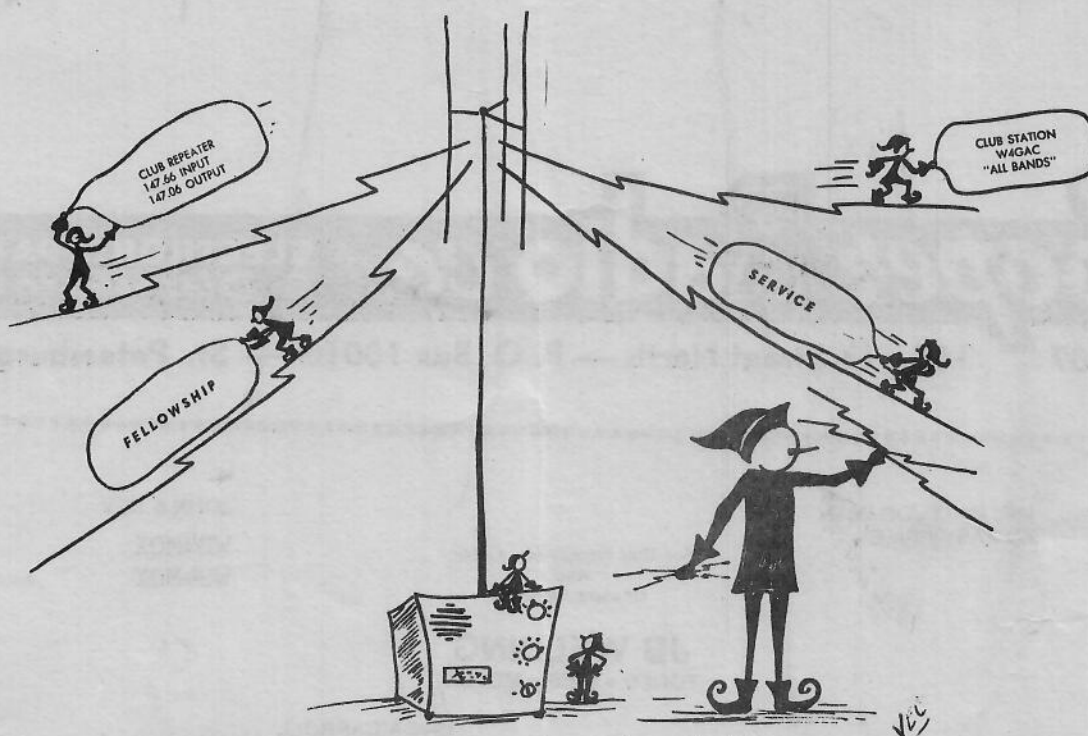

RTTY NEWS CONTINUING WITH OUR BASICS FROM LAST MONTH:

This power supply delivers the required 60 ma continuously; All day and, if you leave on as I do, all night too. This is the only function the supply does. When the terminal unit detects the presence of a space tone, it interrupts the flow of current in the loop for as long as the tone is present. When the mark tone is there, the loop is conducting. This term "LOOP" that we are using is referring to nothing other than a pair of wires that is carrying the current between the different machines.

This brings us to another point that is often overlooked by the RTTY fans that use tube type RTTY equipment, but is extremely important in solid state terminal units. For each additional machine that is used in the loop, the magnetic reverse inductance of that set of coils is also added to the loop and this could add up to seventy volts EACH of a reverse spike on the keying tube or transistor. This additional spike cannot be overlooked in a solid state keyer. IT must be bypassed and reduced to negligible if long life is to be realized from the keying transistor or tube. This is often accomplished by the addition of a 470 ohm one watt resistor in series with a 0.1 mf capacitor to the circuit. This combination is connected from the collector (or hot end of the keyer) to ground (or the cold end of the keyer). Additional hints next month. 73

ATTENTION ALL ARRL AFFILIATED CLUBS: Amateurs of North America are asked to watch for transatlantic propagation on frequencies above 21 MHz during the spring and summer season of 1976. The North Atlantic path was active on 21 and 28 MHz several times in summer, 1974 and 75, but the full potential of the E-layer mode was not realized because of lack of activity in many areas. There is no 50-MHz band in Europe, but crossband work to 21 or 28 MHz may be possible when those frequencies are open. A cw beacon near 50.1 MHz may be operated in France, but official permission has not yet been given. The chance of 2-meter transatlantic work seems remote, but tests and monitoring are encouraged. The European band is 144 to 146MHz. Early daylight hours have been most productive on 20 MHz but evening work has been reported. European beacon stations between 28.16 and 28.195 MHz provide reliable evidence of band conditions, particularly DL/TIGI 28.195, nad GB3SX, 28.18 MHz Please report and reception or two-way work to W1HDQ, ARRL Headquarters.

AMATEUR RADIO SERVICE GROWING AGAIN: By Vic Clark - W4KFC Vice Pres. ARRL Auto Call: for the first time in several years, a growth trend appears to have been restored to the amateur radio population. FCC figures show an overall gain in the Amateur Service of 256,264 to 260,091, from March 1 to December 1, 1975. Conditionals are down 1045, Generals are down 2526, while all other classes are up, led by Advanced with an increase of 4105. While the overall increase (3827) is a small percentage of the amateur body as a whole, it is in the right direction. Much of the credit for this encouraging development undoubtedly belongs to clubs and individuals sponsoring training courses for new amateurs!!!

OFFICIAL ARRL BULLETIN #585 - ARRL has just received preliminary word about FCC action on two letter callsigns for Extra Class licenses, in Docket 20092. Effective July 1, Extra Class licensees holding two letter calls or eligible under present rules for them may apply for the specific call they would like to have. Three months later, the privilege will be extended to those achieving Extra Class approximately ten years ago.

Gradually the seniority provision will be phased out. More details after the news release has been received, probably around April 20.

OFFICIAL ARRL BULLETIN #586 - ARRL has received further word on two letter call signs for Extra Class licensees, in Docket 20092. Effective July 1, 1976 Extra Class licensees currently holding two letter calls or eligible for them under present rules may apply for the specific two letter call of their choice. Beginning October 1, 1976 licensees who held an Extra before November 22, 1967 may request a specific two letter call. Beginning January 1, 1977 those who had an Extra before July 2, 1974 may apply. Beginning April 1, 1977 those who held an Extra before July 1, 1976 may apply. Finally, beginning July 1, 1977 those who obtain an Extra after July 1, 1976 may apply. FCC will not accept any applications received prior to the above dates. One by three calls will be considered in a later FCC action.

OFFICIAL ARRL BULLETIN # 587 - FCC has issued a notice of proposed rulemaking, Docket 20777, that would delete entirely all references to specific emission types, such as A1, A3, etc. in the amateur radio rules. FCC proposes to replace the present provisions with limitations on the allowed bandwidth which an amateur signal may occupy in certain portions of the amateur bands. Four categories of permissible bandwidth are proposed. These are less than 350 Hz, less than 3.5 kHz, less than 35 kHz, 35 kHz, 35 kHz or more. CW and RTTY emissions would fall in the less than 350 Hz subbands. SSB, FAX, and conventional sstv would be allowed in the 3.5 kHz or less subbands and conventional am and nbfm would fall into the 35 kHz or less category. Watch for details in QST. Comment deadline June 23, reply comments July 23.

OFFICIAL ARRL BULLETIN # 588 - The Federal Communications Commission announced on May 7th 1976 that because of the urgent need for emergency communications as a result of the recent earthquake in Italy, the Italian government has agreed to permit third party traffic between U.S. and Italian amateurs for the duration of the emergency.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN # 589 - Now is the time to obtain entry forms for several upcoming ARRL operating activities. For the June VHF QSO Party only log sheets are required, containing space for fifty contacts per sheet. For Field Day dupe sheets are required, one per band/mode, plus a summary sheet. The July Bicentennial Celebration requires special log sheets containing space for 200 contacts, dupe sheets for each mode and a summary. All of these forms are ready for immediate distribution from ARRL when requests are accompanied by a large addressed and stamped envelope. Please indicate the contest forms required.

YACHTS SAIL FOR ISLA MUJERES

The eighth sailing of the St. Petersburg-Isla Mujeres Yacht Race took place April 24th at 9:00 a.m. East of the St. Petersburg Pier. This 465 mile race is still one of big-time yacht racing's few fun races. Dave Davis, W4GQ starts communications with XE3DE Alfredo in Merida, Yucatan weeks prior to the race, passing necessary information.

I was asked by Dave to help him with communications here so that the information on the start of the race could be passed to the authorities in Wucatan. I asked for help on two meters and had excellent response. Dave and I would like to thank the following people for their help; WA4FYR Paul Jordan and Sandy on the starting boat, WA4DUT Steve Pazar who was on the Coast Guard Auxillary boat at the Skyway Bridges, WB4FYS Victor Astolfi for making the arrangements with the Coast Guard Auxillary so we could have WA4DUT aboard. WB4YTY John Komp for the loan of his HR2A to Steve WA4DUT. K4SCL Woody for permission to use the repeater as needed. Bill Bonner, skipper of the "Moon Mist" and Gerald Henry of the Coast Guard Auxillary.

Starting information was passed ny WA4FYR Paul on the official boat, to Dave W4GQ, Alfredo XE3DE, and Jim K4FCW who were on the top deck of the Pier. Soon after Dave and Alfredo went to the Albert Whitted Airport and in Alfredo's plane went to the area of the Skyway Bridges.

A little excitement happened....a filler cap on the plane was leaking slightly and was spotted by the skipper of another boat who is a Ham K4NX and also a plane pilot, He did not know that there was 52 simplex on the plane so he went thru Tampa airport tower to contact the plane. They returned to the airport and put in new gaskets and all was ok. Meanwhile Steve WA4DUT was writing down the information and the times the yachts passed under the western bridge and this information was passed to Barney K4NB on 52 simplex. With Dave and Alfredo in the plane and Steve on the boat things worked out extremely well all around.

The first two yachts arrived at the island on Tuesday afternoon late and the remainder on Wednesday. There was a great celebration as this is one of the biggest dates on the Island's calendar and the locals mostly fishermen and sailors from the Mexican naval vessels based here, go out of their way to make the invaders welcome.

During all these activities, Barney K4NB was maintaining communications with XE3DE in Merida and also with XE3DE at Isla Mujeres Sons of Alfredo XE3DE who was here at the time. This was done on twenty meters.

On Wednesday Dave W4GQ after receiving information from XE3DE at Isla Mujeres as to the race standings... passed this information to all the local T.V. stations here in St. Petersburg and was used on the 11 P.M. newscasts. The results were also given to the St. Petersburg Times sport editor for use in the Thursday April 29th morning paper.

We were honored at this meeting by the presence of Ken Crumpton W4JYE, Vice President of the Florida Repeater Council. Ken indicated next meeting of FRC will be in June at Starke, Fla. at which there will be election of officers. Upon receipt of more definite information, we will try to have WR4ALM represented at this meeting.

Recently the repeater has been kept busy a great deal of the time with idle conversation of little importance. While this is sort of part and parcel of Amateur Radio, it is pretty rough on your trustee, control operators and others who are dedicated to monitoring the repeater nearly continuously to ensure that it is working properly and that emergencies are handled skillfully. Accordingly, K4SCL made a plea asking all users to keep transmissions brief, giving some consideration as to whether what they are saying needs to be said at all, leaving space between transmissions for stations to break with more important transmissions and even to let the repeater rest once in a while !!!! Stations, especially base stations, desiring to carry on long-winded QSOs should consider shifting to simplex frequencies so that the many listeners on the repeater would not be forced to listen to your (very clever and entertaining ?!?) transmissions or shut off their receivers.

The subject of keeping the repeater open for general use all night or past our curfew hour of 11 P.M. came up for discussion again. All our current control operators are people who sleep at night. They put in untold hundreds of hours monitoring so that the repeater can remain open. Being awakened for an occasional bonified emergency is tolerable, but being kept awake by idle chatter or malicious keying up of the repeater during our silent period of 11 P.M. to 6 A.M. can not be tolerated. This will necessitate shutting down the repeater. Although several "night persons" volunteered to take over control at night, the trustee vowed he would not appoint anybody as control operator unless he is a mature and experienced amateur who is personally trusted to share the trustee's responsibility.

WA4CTM moved to have the drop-out delay shortened to 2 seconds and require all stations to wait for the drop-out before transmitting, thus giving time for emergency break-ins. After discussion of technical implications, the motion died for lack of a second. However, it was requested that all stations allow time for the emergency break-ins. It is also requested that transmissions be kept short. Two sentences should be enough for most transmissions.

The SPARC Repeater now managed by K5IHH/4 is going great !!! During April it had average check-ins of 31.6 stations per session -- more than any other net in the State. Nineteen stations have earned net certificates by checking in at least 10 times per month for the last three months. These stations are: WA4CMJ/4 AA4CVV W4EGM K4FCW WA4FPS WA4FYR W4GPL WB4HYH K5IHH/4 W4IRA K4KE WA4KCR K4KXC K4NAN W4NOK WA4NFA K4SCL K4TH and WB4ZPU.

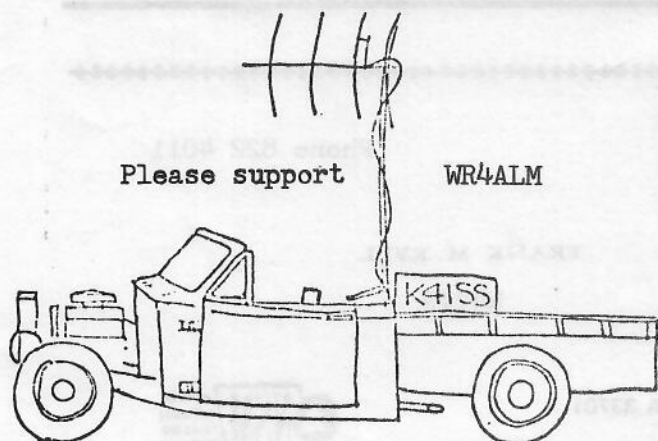
