I am writing in response to your request for additional information in block number three of the accident reporting form. I put "poor planning" as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter that I should explain more fully, and I trust that the following detail will be sufficient.

I am an amateur radio operator. On the day of the accident I was working alone on the top section of my new 80 foot tower. When I had completed my work, I discovered that I had, over the course of several trips up the tower, brought up about 300 pounds of tools and spare hardware. Rather than carry the un-needed tools and materials down by hand, I decided to lower the items down in a small barrel by using a pulley, which fortunately was attached to the gin pole at the top of the tower.

Securing the rope at ground level, I went to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and material into the barrel. Then I went back to the ground level and untied the rope, holding tightly to insure a slow descent of the 300 pounds of tools. You will note in block

number eleven of the accident reporting form that I weigh only 155 lbs.

Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say I proceeded at a rather rapid rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot level I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley.

Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold onto the rope in spite of my pain. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed approximately 20 pounds. I refer you again to my weight in block number eleven. As you might imagine I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40 foot level, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and lacerations of my legs and lower body.



To all SPARC members...Don; t get zapped by AC leakage from QST. de AA4YA.. your rig! A simple test unit, as shown in the illustration, will tell you if excessive leakage is present. Connect the unit's ground terminal to a separate ground, then touch the remaining terminal to any metallic part of the rig. If the voltage reads 7.5 valts RMS you have a leakage current of 5 mma . This is a hazard potential (especially to pacer wearers) and should be corrected. For receivers made since Jan. 1973 the leakage must not exceed .75 volts (RMS). That corresponds to 0.5 ma current. Obviously this test is made with the rig plugged into the AC. Repeat the test with the power switch in the off position but still plugged in to AC!

The second illustration shows the value of using polarized plugs ... If your rig has old 2 pin plugs it would help to change them to polarized types. Plugs are cheaper than funerals!!!!!! 73- B, 11- AAYYA

Typical flow of electrical current.


Return "cool" line (neutral). "Hot" line (live).


Polarized

When the switch is "off"—the hot line is "off" No current flows beyond the switch. grounded (neutral) hot (live) Switch ground

Non-polarized

Even though the switch is "off" the hot line MAY still be "on." Here, the woman's body acts as a conductor to ground, completing the circuit.





CONSTRUCTION DETAILS FOR TUNABLE TRAPS


A tunable stub can be constructed from 300 ohm twin lead or 75 ohm coaxial cable to effectively minimize FM interference (TVI) or other sources of RF interference, within a range of 40 to 990 MHz entering a television receiver via the VHF or UHF antenna terminals.

A tunable stub is composed of a length of 300 ohm twin lead or coaxial cable and a ceramic trimmer. The trimmer is soldered on one end of the line and the other end is terminated with a short, or left open.




Fig. 3—75 Ohm Coax Tunable Stub Trap




Fig. 4—Broad-Band Tunable Stub Trap

The table shown below gives the length of the transmission line and the type of termination to use on the end of the line for the construction of tunable stubs (Refer to Figures 1, 2, 3 and 4 for detailed drawings).

All of the above tunable stubs tune very sharply and must be tuned carefully. To broad band a tunable stub, the end can be terminated with a resistor instead of a short. Use a value around 10K ohms. If less rejection is required, use a lower value. See Fig. 4 for location of resistor.

Fig. 2—UHF Open Line Tunable Stub Trap

TUNABLE STUB TRAPS INSTALLATION TECHNIQUES

Tunable traps are installed by taping them to the 300 ohm antenna lead-in (Refer to Fig. 5). The effectiveness of the trap is controlled by several factors:

- Position of the trap along the lead-in: The trap sets up a standing wave at the trapped frequency in the lead-in wire to the receiver. The trap should be moved along the lead-in until the optimum trap placement is found, remembering to retune.
- Physical length of the trap: The length (dimension "L") may be varied and the trimmer adjusted accordingly. A longer trap tends to be "broad band."
- 3. Coupling of the trap to the line: For effective operation it is necessary that the trap be installed against flat 300 ohm lead-in. After final adjustment the trap can be held in place by means of paper or vinyl tape. A convenient initial adjustment technique is to hold it on the 300 ohm line by means of spring loaded plastic clothespins. The clothespins serve as convenient handles during the trimmer adjustment, and allow positioning along the lead-in for optimum attenuation.


